The Message: (Video)

During a time when social and political extremism seems to dominate a society and nation, it is almost impossible to hold any kind of rational dialogue no less come to any kind of common understanding. What has happened is that we do selective listening in our mental processing. We hear what we want to hear and block out that which doesn't support our mental mindset. Thereby, it becomes easy to fall into the trap that proven truths become lies and obvious lies become truth. This means that what is deemed as truth is attached only to the conceived acceptability or believability of the message. It comes down to the fact that the message, whether true or false, is believable so long as it fits within one's mindset. This means that one's freedom of being depends on whether listening happens with an open or closed mindset. Ultimately this determines the future course of a society or nation.

This is so important for us as individuals to understand for it determines how we live. Jesus clearly points this out in His parable of the soils or how we receive the message of God's kingdom of love and forgiveness. He states there are four kinds of soil which seed can fall upon or four kinds of listeners that God's word can reach.

First, there is the soil of the pathway that has been so hardened by being tread and trampled upon that a seed cannot find refuge in order to grow. It is crushed by travelers' feet or open to be food consumed by birds.

There is no chance for its roots to break the hardened soil and no chance for life in its future. So often we become hardened by all the negatives pressing down upon us; so burdened by feeling tread upon, taken advantage of, hurt, and being misled, that we just stop listening. We turn the outside world off by drawing within ourselves and shutting everybody out. We become like the seeds falling on the hardened pathway which finds no growth or life. This is exactly what happens to Jesus' message when we turn a deaf ear. There is no possibility or hope of a new life or possibility of living the new horizons of the kingdom of God's love.

Next is the seed which falls upon rocky soil. That is, soil that lightly covers a rock base or foundation. This seed will quickly germinate because of the warmth of the rock beneath it. There is much early growth and promise until the roots hit the rock in a futile search for moisture and nourishment. Life is short and the plant withers and dies.

Often we see vivid examples of this soil as we travel our everyday lives. The soil represents people who at first get all excited emotionally about something or some experience. They are all charged up only to find out what they were feeding upon was the emotion of the moment. When the emotion of the moment dies they quickly revert back to their past being. This is very evident within Christianity. People may get caught up in the emotion of a religious experience of only a shallow understanding and momentary commitment. When their understanding or commitment is challenged they are at a loss with nothing to feed them. They quickly fade into the sunset for there is no depth of belief only a brief emotional experience. If Christianity is only an emotional reaction, it leads to its corruption and failure and a dead end street for the individual.

Jesus then tells of the seed falling upon soil which also harbors seeds of thorns and weeds. The seed germinates and grows but so also the quick growing invasive thorns and weeds. Although the soil had the possibility of producing a bountiful harvest that possibility was compromise by the thorns and weeds. Naturally the weeds end up choking out the good plants. Every gardener is well aware of this.

The compromised soil illustrates one of the most difficult challenges we have as Christians. We must constantly evaluate our lives as to whether we harbor the weeds and thorns which drain our lives blocking the reality of God's message from growing and living through us. Do we live to seek selfish desires and wants which keep us from living the life in Christ? These are the weeds of the flesh as Paul relates. The total pursuit of these desires and wants leave little or no room for the pursuit of the kingdom of God. Christ is crowded out and we are strangled by the weeds of our making. There is little love beyond the love for self. But tragically this may just be a losing battle. Paul states, "To set the mind on the flesh is death." This can also be very true for a society. A society which only lives for itself without any regards for others is a society doomed for failure. The weeds which grow out of discontent and injustice will overtake that society.

Finally, Jesus comes to the good soil which is cultivated and free from damaging elements. He stated "Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." The good soil produces all the good fruits of life and gives life to the good news of the kingdom of God. There is no room for hardness of heart, no room for shallow beliefs or the twisting of truth. There is no room for crowding out the true gifts of God's kingdom of love, hope, justice, and peace. But it does demand the commitment to make our lives free from all adverse conditions which may hamper living this life of God's love. It may even demand turning our societal life upside-down. It demands self-examination in order to rid ourselves of those obstructions which we may have allowed to drive our lives.

It must be made clear that there is no glamour or future in man's corruption of this God given life which we share with others. There is no future in planting the seeds of our future in fruitless pursuits. There is no future in denying love and justice to our fellow human beings. Our task is to open our lives to be that good soil by carefully listening and actually hearing the words of life given to us by Jesus. We must listen and prepare ourselves by clearing our lives of all that which can keep us from producing the good fruits of God's love.

Jesus concludes by saying "He who has ears to hear let him hear." Hear the message of Jesus and stop listening to those damaging words of false prophets which have only led us to the brink of disaster. They count on us being the hardened soil of the pathway, the shallow soil covering the rock, and the soil filled with the seeds of self at the expense of others. "He who has ears to hear, let him hear." We must continually prepare and cultivate the good soil in our lives so that we may witness to the good news and find the reality of the kingdom of God's eternal love.
