Celebrate (Introduction)

"On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world."

Life can be filled with surprises. Many surprises come out of the blue leading you never to know what is going to come next. These surprises may come from the most unlikely situations and persons. They may even come from a person who has been living a life of relative obscurity or at least on the fringes of what would be called main stream. Currently we have an example of such a person who within the past few weeks has been propelled from obscurity to national prominence..

Born in Los Angeles in `1198 and raised by a single mother, a school teacher, she struggled with a childhood speech impediment. After extensive therapy she was able to overcome her audio processing disorder. In 2017 she became the first Youth Poet Laureate of the United States and performed at the Library of Congress. She then received a scholarship to Harvard as a sociology major graduating Cum Laude and a member of Phi Beta Kappa last year. She was recognized by Jill Biden at her performance at the Library of Congress and thus began her overnight stardom. Amanda Gorman became the youngest poet to perform at a presidential inauguration. Following President Biden's speech, she incorporated in her poem these words of hope which will resonate throughout history:

"We've seen a force that would shatter our nation rather than share it, Would destroy our country if it meant delaying democracy. And this effort very nearly succeeded. But while democracy can be periodically delayed, It can never be permanently defeated. In this truth, in this faith, we trust. For while we have our eyes on the future, History has its eyes on us."

Her immediate fame was reflected in that she performed at the opening ceremony of the following Super Bowl. Amanda Gorman's books are now on the New York Times; best sellers list and now will become a person of fame of her generation.

Although the rise overnight from obscurity into prominence may not occur every day, it does happen every so often. We have seen it in the sport world, entertainment, politics, the financial world, and in the world literature. Some would say that over-night notoriety is the result of pure luck, while others may say it is being at the right place at the right time with the right people present. There may be some truth to this but just may not be the whole story. It could very well be that the individual may have something to say about it. He or she may have spent years in preparing for the right moment to make their move. By design, or even calculation, there just may be that right moment when preparation meets the reality of fulfillment. This may be the result of sheer determination and even the willingness to step forward. It is then that the special gift, contribution, or talent is made public to accept or reject. Also this moment can become a reality by what many would call divine intervention which is mainly applied when the rise out of obscurity comes when no good reason can be applied. But probably the truth of the matter is that all of the above may be involved.

It is interesting to take note that it seems as though such an over-night lift out of obscurity was the case with Jesus. At least this seems to be since there was no record of His life from the time of Luke's account of Him being in the temple at the age of twelve until His baptism by John. Many believe that at this time He was around 29 years old. We know that He lived in Nazareth and was a carpenter, following in the footsteps of His father Joseph. He was certainly not a person who had risen above others and certainly had not gain any kind of notoriety outside of being a carpenter among a village of common folk. He could have excelled in His trade but that is speculation at best. We know that He was not married, at least there is no indication that He was. This would have made Him even less likely to suddenly become notorious since to not be married was beneath any idea of the norm and even respectability.

Jesus during those first twenty-nine years of life lived a very obscure life. Did people look upon Him as someone who would suddenly become a well-known person in Israel? Was He a person who would be looked upon as a threat to the Jewish establishment? I doubt it very much. In their wildest imagination did they picture Jesus changing the course of history? Would they have ever considered Him to be that Messiah, the very Son of God? They would never have predicted that people would be talking about him some two thousand years later. The only one who would have even the slightest clue as to any of this would have been Mary and perhaps to some degree Joseph, Elizabeth, and Zechariah. Others may have taken note about how blameless and righteous he lived His life. But that in itself may have indicated to them that He was a devout Jew and held in some respect for this. It did not place Him as the Son of God, the Messiah but a man of God.

So here we have this Jesus an obscure twenty-nine year old who was perhaps at the prime of His career. What suddenly propelled Him into sudden prominence? Why did he all of a sudden at this point in time suddenly make His move? Was He getting bored in His trade or

were the people of this small town talking about his being a bachelor getting to Him? Did He now recognize that it was the time to fulfill that which He knew was His mission here on earth? His elevation out of obscurity was definitely not a lucky happenstance. No God's preparation had now been finished. Everything was in place.

John the Baptist had effectively done His mission in preparing the people for Jesus. He had gained fame through a large following of people. He had laid the foundation with His message of repentance and the act of baptism. His message was that he was preparing the people for the Kingdom of God which was at hand. With this preparation being accomplished, it was now time for Jesus to step forward and to complete the work of John with the fulfillment of the good news.

Jesus not only needed John to prepare the people for Him but also to introduce Him to the people, after all he was just an obscure carpenter from Nazareth. He needed the endorsement of this itinerant preacher who had such a great following. So Jesus went to John as he was baptizing in the river Jordon. Jesus had come to be baptized not as a cleansing of sins but in recognition that man needs to have a life of repentance and forgiveness. Matthew states that John, recognizing Jesus as the fulfillment of his preparation, argued with Jesus stating that John needed to be baptized by Jesus. But Jesus responded "Let it be so now, for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Jesus was saying that Baptism was more than an act of cleansing but the actual sign and commitment to living that righteous life as a child of God. This was the transforming act of Baptism and was validated by God's confirmation. "And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved, with you I am well pleased.'"

The time and the place of Jesus coming out of obscurity was not left to chance but a carefully designed plan in order to take the next step towards fulfilling the purpose of the Incarnation. It was time to bring the good news of God's revelations of love, forgiveness, and eternal life to all of mankind. Coming out of obscurity would now publicly begin Jesus' road to the cross and the resurrection. He would almost over-night begin to be that miracle worker and teacher which would bring thousands of people to Him. Obscurity would no long be an option but the revelation of God's love would be His total purpose. Coming out of obscurity by Jesus would become the biggest surprise ever perpetrated upon mankind.

This is the first Sunday in Lent and now we too will be entering Jesus' life as He journeys to the Cross and the empty tomb. It is a time in which we must recommit to our Baptism which directs us to follow this path out of obscurity into a life of witnessing to this good news of God's love. We must follow the footsteps of Jesus in order that we may not only know God's grace for us but to live and share it. No longer can we yield to the temptation to hide this witness by hiding it but we must let it shine forth with the radiance and joy of the knowledge of the Resurrection to come. That is our journey during this season of Lent.
