## **Celebrate (Introduction)**

"Today is the first of five Sundays with Gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not worthy enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform the world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied"

This past Thursday the church council began a process of self-examination as a church in order to begin to prepare for the future. This one night session is only a beginning in the process. We discovered what we thought to be our strengths and weaknesses which led us to celebrate our strengths but confronted with the challenge of our weaknesses. This led us to begin to look to our society and why there has been a drastic turn-away from the traditional main-line church. In this process it became very evident that we are being challenged from within as well as from the circumstances of society.

There is little doubt that the church as a religious institution and not just a social, political, or entertaining entity, is viewed by a growing majority as being hypocritical to its core message. Through the past fifty years it has lost its credibility of being relevant to the situations of a problem filled society and life. In far too many instances the church is seen as a part of society's problem. In far too many circumstances it has become the political ally of political extremism promoting hatred and divisiveness. Secularism and the promotion of wealth and greed have not only become society's religion but is being preached as a Christian virtue in far too many pulpits. This is all in plain view of everybody and then affects their views of the church.

To be the Body of Christ, the church, in this highly tumultuous time is a challenge. To add to the challenge is to live through a deadly and fearful pandemic which may be extended beyond what it should by political extremism which has invaded and controls many religious institutions. There is little doubt that the pandemic has affected the sustainability and the life of the church when it should be under control. For far too many, the church is viewed as self-serving and not true to the basic teachings of Christianity. This leads the church as being a reflection of a society filled with mistrust, divisiveness, and extremist ideologies. In reality it is seen as one of the influences of disunity which has overtaken our lives and threatens to destroy us. This is the challenge we face.

It is to this very situation which Paul addresses in his prayer for the church at Ephesus. He begins: "For this reason, I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name" Paul clearly makes the point that, regardless of who we may be, we are unified in that there is the same Father who created us all. God is the father of "...every family in heaven and on earth...." This means we are bound together in the unity of being brothers and sisters created by God, the Father of us

all. When we recognize that God is our Father, as we pray in the Lord's Prayer, then we are saying we are a part of the family of mankind held together in unity through His love for us. To Paul this unity is lived in the church and is essential for its very existence. We must never let the pressures of society's divisiveness divide us.

He goes on to express in his prayer that this unity under the Father and creator is given life when the very Spirit of God is allowed to fill the lives of those in the church by taking the life and message of Christ as the very core and essence of one's being. This happens when the inner being is grounded in the love of God as found in Jesus' life. Therefore, the unity of the church is realized when each individual member's inner being is under the power of this love. It is through this love that we are strengthened and unified with each other and to the world in which we live.

In love there is no room for the extremes which promote discord and disunity. Aristotle believed that the true wisdom in life is to strive for the "Golden means." That is to say, the extremes in and of themselves, may not be the answer at all but each may have elements of an answer or solution. When married together then the truest answer may be found — the "Golden Means." In this unity, truth may be found. Love is that "Golden means" in life which takes us beyond our own egos and desires in order to bring life and even well-being to another person. Love is the giving of oneself. The only extreme in love is love itself. It is this love which brings the unity of spirit within the fellowship of believers which then radiates into the life which surrounds us.

So Paul prays for the church, "I pray that, according to the riches of this glory, He may grant that you be strengthened in your inner being with the power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in our hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love." Being rooted and grounded in this love demands that we begin to take this love of God to new heights in our lives. Paul relates in order to do this we must have the power or the ability to comprehend the totality of this love – its meaning and experience. This comes when we are in unity with the saints or with those who have become one with Christ. It is within the unity of the fellowship of believers that we experience the fullness of God's love. This does not happen with knowledge alone but in living relationships of loving and forgiving one another. The unity found in this love is far beyond any human knowledge which we may accumulate.

We can have all the academic degrees in the world, we can have all the knowledge of science and the humanities, we may even have all the knowledge of theology and the Bible, but without the unity within the bonds of God's love we are left adrift on the troubling seas of everyday life. Therefore Paul continues his prayer. "I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth, and the length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

It is when we, the church, can fulfill Paul's prayer to be that Body of Christ in the unity of God's love that we will be able to answer the cries and pains of the world in which we live. It is with the power of the unity we have in God's love which gives us the ability to be that example of unity as children of the family of humankind. Paul relates that this power is far beyond anything we may imagine - far beyond anything the world has to offer.

We may find that the Olympics over the next two weeks will give us somewhat of a reprieve as to the polarization and negativity of our day and age. But, sadly that will most likely only be a reprieve and will

not be that on-going unifying drive which is so desperately needed and longed-for. After the flame of the Olympics is extinguished everything will all to quickly return to as it was before.

It is important for us, the church, to take Paul's prayer to heart for we should be that oasis within the heat of the dry desert to offer not only relief to all who are caught up in the turmoil of disunity and extremism but to be an on-going example of unity in and through the love and forgiving message of God. This is a powerful tool which can and does change lives when it is lived. Many of us may look for the church institutions to change but that is not where it must begin. It begins within each of us and it begins within the fellowship of believers here at Epiphany. The stronger we become in our unity in God's love and with each other, the more we will become that beacon of hope and life for the world in which we live.

Thankfully, Epiphany in so many ways has been able to overcome the temptation to become embroiled in the extremism which bombards us as we come together each week. This is as it should be and needs to be in order for the Body of Christ to remain unified and united so that together we may reach out in love and forgiveness to each other and to all who come into our midst. As we look to the future in our planning to be that alive Body in Christ, we must never allow our unity in God's love to be compromised by the destructive influences of an extremist, polarized society. Rather, we must seek to share our unity in God's love in every way possible. We may be small in numbers but are, and can be even more so, gigantic in sharing Gods love with each other and with the world in which we live. It is up to each of us as individuals and together.
